

To the Honorable Council of the City of San Diego

At a called meeting of the women voters of La Jolla held Aug-18-1914 the following resolutions were passed by a unanimous vote.

Resolved, that we most sincerely protest against the action of the City Council in devoting funds necessary to the existence of the City Farm to the improvement of the Torrey Grade- that we consider the City Farm, under the management of Max Watson, one of the most important and effective agents for good within the city of San Diego- that the aid and encouragement it has given to a class of men, too seldom reached by other forms of organized effort, is worth far more to San Diego than the improvement of a road- that from a material standpoint the City Farm is of vast value to the community- but we would emphasize, that from a moral, and from a humanitarian standpoint its value cannot be overestimated.

We would urge the Council to think well ere they cripple and destroy a work of such worth and promise, a work that has arrested the attention and evoked the outspoken admiration of many of the leading writers on one of the most important topics of the day- the intelligent and efficient administration of municipal affairs.
